For LATAM, RSPO has no commitment






REGIONAL TARGETS: RECAP







- E = EU & US 100% CSPO by 2020
- M = Malaysia & Indonesia 50% CSPO by 2020
- C = China (10%) & India)(30%) CSPO by 2020
- C = Composition of 30% of smallholder volume, 1.2 million families or 2.4 million ha by 2018.

What does it mean? Shared responsibility principles in the new P&C 2018

These principles include:

- 1. Transparency and ethics
- 2. Legal compliance
- 3. Respect for human rights and benefits
- 4. Workers rights and conditions
- 5. Energy use, Pollution, and Greenhouse gas emissions

How can we enforce this? Would it raise barriers for uptake?
